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
From the Principal

The Spring Term has seen education return to some semblance of normality, with Covid-19 restrictions being eased/lifted, and the need for Covid-19 infected individuals to isolate for significant periods of time being removed.

Schools have started to 'open up' and resume 'normal service' and EGSC is no exception. Whilst the school has maintained its 'zoning model' which has been so successful in helping to control Covid-19, along with staggered lunches and breaks that have minimised cross contamination across year groups, the school has also started to look to September 2022, and a return to a 'normal' school layout, with teachers being reallocated their own teaching bases, rather than being 'nomadic', and students beginning to transition around the school, going to specialist rooms for their lessons.

The start of the Spring term saw Year 11 students receive their mock GCSE results from the December mock examination series. As anticipated, results were promising, reiterating the school's view that teaching and learning across the last two years of the pandemic has been highly effective and caused minimal disruption to student progress. This will stand EGSC students in good stead for the coming summer examination series, which again is a step towards normality. It is vitally important now that Year 11 parents ensure that their daughters continue to work hard and remain focused for this final push before the exams. Students will have revision topics and lists and there should be no day when they feel that they have no homework or revision to complete. Testing and mock examinations will continue, as scheduled, so that teachers know exactly what gaps exist in student understanding and how to fill these.

There are exciting new developments afoot around the Trust rethinking of its curriculum model. The ramifications of this change in direction will have significant implications for EGSC, including a greater emphasis on creative and technical subjects, including the introduction of food technology in September 2023, and the expectation that students will make options choices at the end of year 9, rather than year 8.



From the Principal

Staffing at EGSC has remained stable, with few staff leaving the school at the end of the Autumn term and the staffing body actually being expanded to further enhance the quality of education at the school, through increasing staffing to student ratios, allowing even more targeted support for the least able and most vulnerable. Indeed in many subjects now, sets 4 and 5 are taught by two or more adults, increasing the opportunities for targeted support and intervention.

The school has continued to receive accolades from a range of forums, including visiting HMIs, and Dr Jo Saxton, the Chief Regulator for Ofqual. Students have continued to raise the profile and reputation of the school in the local and national community through participation in a range of events, forums, and competitions. In particular, the school recently received the 2022 CATB (The Classical Association Teaching Board) National Teaching Award for 'Making Classics More Inclusive'. This award recognises the school's commitment to a highly academic curriculum through its delivery of the Classical Civilisations qualification, traditionally associated with Grammar and Private School settings. Furthermore, the PE department has now selected a number of sports teams that have competed, successfully, against other Coventry schools.

Of course, the school remains committed to maintaining its Ofsted outstanding rating. A key contributor to this will be the school's summer outcomes, which are forecast to ensure that the school remains in the top 1% of schools nationally for all performance measures. This is testimony to the efforts and work of the school staff, teaching and support, in ensuring that all students at the school continue to receive a world class education.

I continue to be proud to be considered capable of leading EGSC and we, as a school, continue to strive for excellence in all that we do. I thank you as parents, and the wider community, for your ongoing support.

Revision Tips for Success



We continue to prepare our young people for their GCSE exams. From September we have held additional catchup sessions after school and on a Saturday. The attendance to these sessions has been impressive, consistently above 90%, indicating the commitment and dedication of our Year 11 students.

We are pleased with the advanced information received from exam board this year to support our pupils to revise for the upcoming exams, they have considered the difficulties faced by young people around the country over the last two years. Our teachers have structured lessons, revision plans and homework carefully using the advanced information. Our teachers have been busy analysing assessments so that they can plan according to your child's needs and produce tailored guidance for them to reach their target grades.

Please ensure your child is taking revision seriously and completing all work set by the school. We have provided revision guides, workbooks, and knowledge organisers. Effective revision coupled with active engagement in lessons and intervention sessions will support our young people to achieve successful outcomes at the end of this academic year.

We know just how difficult (and tiring) the exam period can be — we've all been there. To help give pupils a gentle nudge in the right direction, check out some of our top tips:

A small number of pupils were self-isolating and learning remotely at the time of the visit. Since the beginning of the autumn term, approximately one tenth of pupils have studied remotely at some point.

- 1. Start revising early not days before the exam.
- **2.** Plan your revision using a timetable planning out your revision means you can spend more time revising and less time worrying you've forgotten something.

- 3. Don't spend ages making your notes look pretty this is just wasting time. For diagrams, include all the details you need to learn, but don't try to produce a work of art.
- 4. Set up a nice, tidy study space you'll need somewhere with good lighting, your pens close by, your phone out of sight and your TV unplugged. Try not to revise on your bed, or you'll be dreaming before you know it.
- 5. Vary your revision with different activities try a variety of different revision techniques - answering practice questions, writing down notes from memory, and using revision guides, flash cards, workbooks.
- **6. Stick revision notes all around your house** so in the exam you think, "Aha, quadratic equations, they were on the fridge..."
- 7. **Do lots of practice papers and question** you'll find it far easier to answer questions in the exam if you've tried similar ones at home beforehand.
- 8. Set aside time to do fun things, don't turn into a revision zombie don't totally stop yourself from having fun. This'll help you stay motivated, relax, and allow you to keep up with your favourite hobbies.
- **9. Keep your phone and other distractions away** phones are great but stick it in a drawer while you're revising.
- 10. Sleep and eat properly sleep is more important than you'd imagine it helps your brain store all the juicy information you've learned throughout the day. Drinking plenty of water and eating healthy foods will also boost your concentration throughout the day.

Success this year will be the result of effective preparation and active engagement. We wish all our pupils the best for the upcoming exams.


British Science Week

This year's British Science Week theme is 'Growth'.


Our KS3 Science Club has taken to the Growth theme and are getting ready to plant their hydroponic plants into our plant beds. They have worked hard with Year 10 to grow hydroponic plants using the hydroponics system. To ensure this is sustainable they will be re-planting them into the raised beds and watching them grow. This activity led to many conversations about sustainability and the importance of growing our own food. We have been looking at factors that will make the plants grow at the optimum rate. We will be regularly updating the progress of our plants over on Twitter.

To further celebrate British Science Week here at Eden Girls Coventry we have been partaking in different experiments during lunchtime. Y7 and 8s got stuck into some hands-on experiments such as flame tests, making their own lava lamp and how to make a hovercraft balloon using old, recycled CDs. The students also learnt the science behind how clouds work and what causes rain. This involved an activity called 'storm in a glass' using shaving foam, food colour and water, whilst Y9 and 10 scientists investigated 'Growth' by building the tallest and most secure tower using just marshmallows and spaghetti sticks!


Careers Education

Enrichment

Our enrichment and extra-curricular activities help all pupils develop the skills and characteristics that will provide a solid foundation for all aspects of their lives as future business, professional and community leaders. We thrive on academic excellence, but our pupils benefit educationally, personally, and socially from a rich all rounded educational experience.

Over the spring term, we have had the opportunity to introduce some exciting experiences such as Archery, Spanish and a Garden of Eden project in science. Our pupils are striving in learning new things, that would not be covered within the academic day.

A small insight to what the pupils have been covering:

Garden of Eden project (Science): The task will be to prepare a piece of land (3m x 3m) on the school grounds to grow varieties of vegetable produce. Pupils will need to think about how to manage water, fertiliser and chemical usage to respect the environment. They will need to design apparatus to collect and dispense rainwater, effective use of natural fertilisers/ compost with weekly management of the garden. There will be opportunities to think about how to protect the growing vegetables from pests and adverse weather conditions. Pupils will be working in small groups and be managing their eco gardens, keeping track of the weekly progress.

Arts and Craft:

Pupils have been introduced to a range of creative activities such as resin keyring making, tie dye cushion making, t-shirt designing, mosaic creating and many more.

Netball:

Our pupils have been attending various netball sessions with a Wasp's netball coach alongside forming their own netball team within each year group and being given the opportunity to play against other schools, with support from Mrs Imran.

Japanese

Pupils have been learning about the Japanese language and culture with O'Meara-Sensei on Thursdays after school.

Children's Mental Health Week

It was wonderful to see all the students dressed up in their cultural clothing.

As part of the programme this year, we took part in **Place2Be's** Children's Mental Health Week and fundraising to support the mental health of children and young people throughout the UK – a cause we feel is now more important than ever. **Place2Be** believe every child should have easy access to mental health support whenever they need it. They create safe spaces in schools where students can open up without pressure, arming them with emotional skills to help deal with everything life throws at them. As a charity, **Place2Be** rely heavily on the generosity and support of the community to continue their essential work in the future and to reach children before it is too late.

- Incorporate exercise into your daily routine, even if it's just a walk down the street.
- · Encourage conversations about how your child is feeling
- · Complete a wellbeing journal with your child
